#### AN INTRODUCTION TO MACOMB COUNTY

The first white settlement in Macomb County was built in 1784 on the banks of the Clinton River, then known as the Huron River. A Missionary group known as the Moravians pitched their tents on the south bank of the river approximately three miles west of Mt. Clemens, in the summer of that year. Known as "New Gnadenhutten," the mission had the distinction of being the first settlement in the State of Michigan. Four years later the Moravians were forced to leave the area by the Chippewa Indians.

In 1796, a settlement was established again on the Clinton River by a man named Christian Clemens. This settlement, later named Mount Clemens, was located a few miles downstream from the one previously established by the Moravians. The area of Macomb County was then part of Wayne County which included almost the entire State of Michigan and portions of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin.

In 1818, Macomb County (named after General Alexander Macomb) was formally organized as the third County in the State of Michigan, after Wayne and Monroe Counties. At that time, it covered a much larger area than it does today, extending north through much of the thumb area, east to Lake Huron, and west to the middle of the State. The southern boundary, Eight Mile Road, served as the baseline of the State. In 1819 and 1820, larger portions of the County were removed to form the Counties of Oakland, Lapeer, Genesee, and St. Clair.

Two years later, the current boundaries were reached when small portions of land were added back to the County.

Urbanization in Macomb County paralleled that of most of the other areas in the eastern United States during the nineteenth century. Mainly devoted to agriculture, the County contained a number of villages where population was concentrated. By 1920, two significant developments occurred that would shape the future of Macomb. The first was the establishment of Selfridge Field near Mount Clemens in 1917, which was to spur growth in that area. The other development, much more significant, was the beginning of the urbanization movement northward from the City of Detroit.

Macomb County is located within the northern segment of one of the largest metropolitan areas in the nation. As such, it enjoys the benefits of the larger urban center, Detroit, while still possessing suburban and rural characteristics.

The County Seat, Mount Clemens, is approximately twenty miles north of the City of Detroit, 80 miles north of Toledo and 285 miles northeast of Chicago. Excellent highway routes to Canada and all parts of the United States accentuate Macomb County's favorable location. The dynamics of the Detroit Metropolitan Area are reflected in the substantial residential, commercial and industrial development of the County.

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The locational advantages of the County are among its best assets. These include:

- A good system of interstate, State and County highways, with more to be constructed;
- Close proximity to important business and industrial centers in the State;
- One of the largest multi-campus Community Colleges in the country;
- Large recreation facilities located within the County;

- Open land for the development of residential, commercial, industrial and recreational uses;
- Access to the commercial and recreational advantages of the Great Lakes.

These factors continue to play a large part in the growth of Macomb County. Currently, the population of Macomb County is approximately 717,400 persons.

Only 482 square miles in area, Macomb County is the ninth smallest of Michigan's 83 counties, yet it has a population which ranks third in the State and is larger than that of seven states and the District of Columbia.

Macomb Community College is the only institution of higher education in the County. Our Community College is a comprehensive multi-campus, public institution created by the people of Macomb County more than 30 years ago. From humble beginnings in rented classrooms, the college has grown to three campus sites and a current enrollment of more than 32,000 students.

Macomb County is known as "The Boating Capital of the World" since there are over 40,000 pleasure crafts registered in the County, most of which are berthed at the 91 marinas and at homes located on the many miles of canals and shoreline.

There are three privately licensed airports in the County. Selfridge Air National Guard Base in Harrison Township is the home of elements of the active Air Force, Air Force Reserve, Air National Guard, Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard. Selfridge takes pride in being the only base to have permanently assigned flying units from all five of the uniformed services.

Each of the automotive "Big Three" has extensive operations in Macomb County, the largest being the General Motors Technical Center, located in Warren. The Tech Center is where many General Motors products are developed and it's often called "the magic square mile." The site covers more than 1,000 acres and the entire research complex was designed by Eero Saarinen.

Chrysler Corporation has eight operations in the County, including the new Sterling Heights Assembly Plant which began operation in late 1984.

Romeo is the home of Ford Motor Company's Michigan Proving Grounds and Engine Plant, two of eight Ford operations located in Macomb County. Ford's newly expanded Vinyl Plant and Paint Plant in Mount Clemens, two automotive assembly operations in Utica and Chesterfield, the Sterling Axle Plant and the Van Dyke Transmission and Chassis Plant complete Macomb's Ford family.

Agriculture is an important industry in Macomb County. Its diversified program includes such products as roses, mushrooms, bedding plants, sod, cash crops, vegetables, nursery stock, fruit, dairy and beef. These are but a few of the total of twenty-one different agricultural enterprises flourishing in Macomb County.

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#### MACOMB COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

The Macomb County Board of Commissioners is the legislative, administrative and policy making body of Macomb County government. The board is composed of 25 members, who are elected every two years from 25 districts of equal population. The Macomb County Board of Commissioners' functions on a committee basis. An indication of the scope and subject matter dealt with by the board is revealed in the titles of the various committees. There are nine major standing committees: Budget: Community Services: Finance: Health Services: Justice and Public Safety; Legislative and Administrative Services; Operational Services; Personnel; Planning and Economic Development. There are two special committees — The Senior Citizens Committee and the Rules Committee. Ad Hoc Committees may be appointed as needed, for specific purposes.

#### SESSIONS OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Organizational Session — The first meeting of the session, to be known as the Organizational Session of the Board of Commissioners shall be held in January of each year, at which time the permanent Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Sergeant-at-Arms shall be elected.

Annual Session — (The Annual Session of the Board of Commissioners shall be held each year after September 14 but before October 16.)

#### Public Act No. 261 of 1988 (As amended)

An act to provide for the apportionment of county boards of commissioners; to prescribe the size of the board; to prescribe the manner of election of the members of the county board of commissioners.

Sec. 1. Within 60 days after the publication of the latest United States official documented census figures, the county apportionment commission in each county of this state shall apportion the county into not less than 5 nor more than 35 county commissioner districts as nearly of equal population as is practicable and within the limitation of Section 2.

Section 9. The electors of each district established in accordance with this act shall elect one county commissioner to the county board of commissioners. There shall be no representation on the county board of commissioners other than that set forth by the provision of this act.

Section 10. The term of each commissioner shall be concurrent with that of state representatives as specified in Article 4, Section 3 of the state constitution.

Section 11. Candidates for the office of commissioner shall be residents and registered voters of the district which they seek to represent and shall remain so to hold their office, if elected. Nominations and elections for commissioners shall be by partisan elections. To obtain the printing of the name of any person as a candidate for nomination for the office of commissioner upon the offi-

cial primary ballot, there shall be filed with the county clerk of each county, a filing fee of \$100 or nomination petitions signed by a number of qualified and registered electors residing with the district, equal to but not less than 1% nor more than 4% of the number of voters cast in the district by such party for the office of secretary of state at the last general election in which a secretary of state was elected. The deadline for filing nominating petitions or filing fees shall be the same as candidates for state representatives.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

#### COUNTY OFFICERS

The Michigan Constitution provides that the voters of each county must elect a Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, Register of Deeds, County Treasurer and Drain Commissioner or Public Works Commissioner every four years.

#### CLERK AND REGISTER OF DEEDS

Macomb County has combined the Clerk and Register of Deeds offices and Edna Miller holds that office. Over 1,110 different services are performed by the office of the County Clerk, most of them statutory.

The County Clerk is clerk of the Circuit Court and clerk of the following boards: Board of Commissioners, Board of Election Commissioners, Tax Allocation Board, Board of County Canvassers, County Plat Board, Civil Service Commission — Macomb County Sheriff Department, Election Scheduling Committee and Concealed Weapons Licensing Board.

Other functions of the Clerk are primarily record keeping in nature. The Vital Records Section has records of county births and deaths from 1867, marriage licenses issued from 1819. Certificates of assumed names and copartnerships, records of discharges of military personnel and records of these persons authorized to practice certain professions are some of the various records the Clerk is required by law to keep. The Clerk issues marriage licenses, notary public commissions, concealed weapons permits and processes passport applications.

All Circuit Court cases, both civil and criminal, are started in the Clerk's office and records of these cases, dating from 1848 are kept there.

The Clerk's Election Department conducts state and

county elections. The canvass of votes in state, county, school and some city and township elections is under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk who is responsible to the Michigan Secretary of State for certified results of elections.

The Register of Deeds records all deeds and mortgages which have to do with properties located within the boundaries of Macomb County. All subdivision plats within the county are also on record in the Register's office. Financing statements on automobiles and other personal property are filed, as are attachments, lis pendens, federal tax liens, Michigan tax liens, mechanics liens and Sheriff's deeds.

#### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

The Prosecuting Attorney, Carl J. Marlinga, is the chief law enforcement officer in the County. The office is established by the Michigan Constitution and the duties and qualifications of the Prosecuting Attorney are set by statute.

The Prosecuting Attorney is a sworn impartial arbiter, charged with the conduct of criminal prosecution of the violations of state criminal laws in the interest of the people. As a minister of justice, he is also charged with defending those unjustly accused.

He represents the County in all Courts of the County and before the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals in criminal matters in which the state or county is interested. Several units provide specialized services in several key areas: Victim-Witness Unit, Consumer Protection Division, Anti-Drug Unit and Auto-Theft Division.

In Macomb County, the Prosecuting Attorney's office is on the Sixth Floor of the Court Building. It is staffed with 51 attorneys — Prosecuting Attorney Marlinga and his 50 appointed Assistants. They service the District Courts, Municipal Courts, the three divisions of Probate Court and nine Circuit Courts.

#### PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSIONER

The basic job of Macomb County Public Works Commissioner Thomas S. Welsh is to build more livable land.

It's an assignment that thrusts his office into the forefront of a wide range of public works activities . . . management, sewage treatment, solid waste disposal, subdivision plat review, soil erosion control, parks and recreation, and construction of storm drains, water lines and sanitary sewers.

His involvement in these programs is extensive and includes responsibility for initial planning, final design, sale of bonds, securing federal/state grants, construction, inspection, maintenance, repair, administration and debt retirement.

Facilities owned or operated by the office include four sewage treatment works, 45 waste water pump stations, 688 miles of storm drains, 185 miles of sanitary sewers and 45 miles of water lines.

The Public Works Commissioner is chairman of the Intra-County Drainage Boards, secretary/member of the Inter-County Drainage Boards, agent for the Macomb County Waste Water Disposal District and a statutory member of the Parks and Recreation Commission and Technical Review Committee of the County Solid Waste Planning Committee.

#### COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

The Community Mental Health Services Board is responsible for providing mental health, substance abuse, and developmental disabilities services in the county through both directly operated and contract agencies. The program is supported by state and county funds as well as individual fees and insurance reimbursement.

There are a number of service programs funded by the agency, including a 24-hour telephone crisis center; a 24-hour psychiatric emergency service; mental health outpatient centers for children and families; mental health outpatient centers for adults; substance abuse treatment and prevention programs; rehabilitation workshops/day programs for developmentally disabled persons; limited residential services; counseling and diagnostic services; client services management functions; a rape crisis program; vocational services; mental health and substance abuse programs for persons in the county jail; recreational drop in centers; and respite services for adults and children.

#### MACOMB COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES AGENCY

Macomb County Community Services Agency (MCCSA) is the Community Action Agency for Macomb. The purpose of the Agency is to promote economic and social opportunities through which the low-income, disabled and elderly can achieve greater independence, dignity and self-sufficiency.

The Agency consists of a number of human service programs, including: General Community Programming, three Community Action Centers, Weatherization, Energy, Head Start, Day Care, Commodity Food Distribution, Food Stamp Distribution, Transportation, Senior Citizens Chore Service, Emergency Food, Senior Citizen Nutrition, and Meals-On-Wheels.

Programs are initiated and overseen by the Macomb County Committee on Community Economic Opportunity and the Macomb County Board of Commissioners. MCCSA is operated using County funds in conjunction with the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Energy, the Department of Labor/Bureau of Community Services, the Office of Services to the

Aging, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the Area Agency on Aging, 1-B.

#### CONCEALED WEAPONS LICENSING BOARD

Michigan law states that the Prosecuting Attorney, the Sheriff and the Commissioner of the Michigan State Police, or their respective authorized deputies, shall constitute boards exclusively authorized to issue licenses for carrying concealed weapons to applicants residing within the county. The County Clerk is the clerk of the board and issues such licenses as approved by a majority of the board.

#### COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

The Cooperative Extension Service is one component of Michigan State University's Education Program established in 1914 under the authority of Federal Smith Lever Act (38th Statute, Law 372) and Michigan Public Act 65, Laws of 1915, and subsequent amendments. Funds are provided to "... aid in diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects related to Agriculture and Home Economics and to encourage the application of the same..."

Non-formal education programs in Macomb County are provided in agriculture, horticulture, natural resources, public policy, home economics, nutrition, and in youth development (4-H). Specialists in subject matter areas at Michigan State University support county staff with programs and services which require special technical knowledge.

Cooperative Extension Service is jointly financed by U.S. Department of Agriculture, Michigan State University and Macomb County Board of Commissioners.

#### SHERIFF

Sheriff William H. Hackel's jurisdiction encompasses the entire County. As a law enforcement agent, it is his sworn duty to enforce all laws and to protect the lives, property and welfare of the people. So that he may fulfill these obligations, he maintains a Sheriff's Patrol, a Marine Patrol, SCUBA divers, polygraph facilities, identification bureau and many other services.

In addition, it is his responsibility to confine and secure all prisoners in the County jail, providing them with proper food and health facilities.

Not only does the Sheriff have criminal jurisdiction, his responsibility also deals in civil process.

The Sheriff is one of three members of the Concealed Weapons Licensing Board.

#### TREASURER

The Office of the County Treasurer exists by virtue of Michigan law, the functions of which are dictated by state statutes, along with guidelines of the Bureau of Local Government Services Audit Division, as agent for State Treasury Department. As County Treasurer, Adam E. Nowakowski, is custodian of all monies and securities of Macomb County. By virtue of his office, he is Treasurer of the County Employees' Retirement System and a voting member of the County Election Commission and County Plat and Tax Allocation Board.

Some of the duties and functions of your County Treasurer include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Agent for the State to conduct the annual May Tax Sale.
- 2. Administrator of the Michigan State Inheritance Taxes.
- 3. Administrator of dog licenses in unincorporated units of government in Macomb County.
- 4. Administrator of deed and plat certifications within Macomb County.
- 5. Administrative agent for the Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund.
- 6. Responsible for collection of Personal Property Delinquent Taxes.

One of the Treasurer's primary and mandated duties, per State Statute, is to settle with all local units of government within Macomb County for delinquent real tax collections. Hence, your County Treasurer becomes responsible for the collection of all delinquent real property and contracted personal delinquent taxes. Starting in 1991, the County Treasurer has collected personal delinquent taxes for those local units who contract for this service. This will amount to approximately 75 percent of all personal delinquent taxes in Macomb County. As the administrative agent for the Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund, the County Treasurer borrows funds by issuing short term notes. The proceeds from these notes are distributed to all units of government for immediate use of their approved tax levy. The short term notes are retired by the collection of delinquent taxes and earned interest. The local school districts, intermediate school, Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, Cities, Townships and Villages in Macomb County appreciate the prompt receipt of funds. The 100% Tax Payment Program was adopted by your Board of Commissioners in 1973.

#### BOARD OF CANVASSERS

Each county must have such a board to canvass all state, county, school and some city, township and village elections. After the primary and general elections, the board reviews, analyzes and scrutinizes results to determine who has been nominated in primary elections and which candidates are elected in general elections. After the general elections, the board delivers certificates of election to the County Clerk. The board is also empowered to conduct recounts in certain elections.

#### CORPORATION COUNSEL

Corporation Counsel and staff serve, as legal counsel to the Board and parliamentarian for all Board meetings. Corporation Counsel provides legal advice to all County officials and departments and prepares and/or reviews and approves all County contracts and resolutions. Corporation Counsel also serves as General Counsel to the Macomb County Employees Retirement System and other Boards, Agencies and Commissions funded

and/or supervised or controlled by the Macomb County Board of Commissioners. In addition, Corporation Counsel represents the County, its officials, and agencies in all civil proceedings that may be brought in the various Federal and State Courts and Tribunals.

#### DEPARTMENT OF SENIOR CITIZEN SERVICES

The Department of Senior Citizen Services provides a variety of programs and services for seniors and persons interested in the welfare of seniors. The services include: Professional counseling services for individuals, family and group in-center or elsewhere; pre-retirement counseling; Legal Assistance; Outreach services in the home or in the community to assess needs and assist in locating services; local coordination for World Medical Relief, Focus Hope Food for Seniors and Michigan Emergency Pharmacy Program for Seniors (MEPPS); Senior Courtesy Card Program; specialized Information and Referral: Guardianship and Conservatorship services; Community education; speakers available to groups; Title V Employment opportunities; Shelter Advisor; Home Share coordination; Chore service referrals; Senior Citizen ID/Discount Card: Telephone Reassurance; Volunteer opportunities; Adult "Enrichment and Respite" Day Care Program: Loan Closet.

Funding is received from the Macomb County Board of Commissioners as well as the Area Agency on Aging 1-B, the Office of Services to the Aging and the Department of Social Services. Referrals are accepted from any source. There is no fee for most services although a nominal fee may be charged for Adult Day Care. Donations are accepted.

## **BOARD OF ELECTION COMMISSIONERS**

The law requires that this board be created to prepare ballots for state and county elections and determine clarity of wording on recall petitions. It consists of the senior Probate Judge, the County Treasurer and County Clerk.

#### EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SYSTEM (EMS)

The EMS System functions under the authority of the Public Health Code.

The Macomb County Medical Control Authority/Board is appointed jointly by the cooperating hospital administrators and the Chairperson of the Board of Commissioners with confirmation by the Board. This Authority/Board is mandated by the Code to assure that all prehospital life support providers, i.e., advanced/limited advanced/basic care services, non-transporting services and medical first responders conform with the rules and regulations promulgated by the Michigan Department of Public Health and the EMS Medical Control Authority/Board.

This Authority/Board is also responsible for establishing protocols, and procedures for patient treatment, quality review, training and continuing education, telecommunications, security, control and exchange of pharmaceutical.

This non-paid Authority/Board, consists of representatives from five participating hospitals, physicians, nurses, emergency medical technicians, ambulance operations, consumers, fire and police associations, community college, county radio and health departments.

The EMS program is administered by the EMS Program Manager through the Macomb County Health Department.

#### EMERGENCY SERVICES

Emergency Services is responsible for the planning, administration, coordination and operation of resources and manpower of all County agencies and departments having a disaster operations capability during declared emergencies. Emergency Services Coordinator acts as staff aide to the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners in time of any nuclear accident, enemy attack, natural disaster or technological disasters. Public warning,

communications, training and development in implementation of survival planning are additional responsibilities.

#### EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT BOARD

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The board was created under the permissive legislation to administer the employees' pension fund.

#### FACILITIES AND OPERATIONS

The department of Facilities and Operations is structured to provide professional engineering and maintenance service in planning, construction, maintenance, and operations of all County-owned buildings and grounds.

The department has four divisions: Facilities Engineering Division, Operations and Mechanical Maintenance Division, Building Maintenance, and Security Division. The entire operation is coordinated through an administrative section.

The Facilities Engineering Division directs and coordinates the professional engineering services such as consultation, investigation, and planning for the construction, alteration and maintenance of all county-owned facilities.

The Operations and Mechanical Maintenance Division is responsible for the proper operation and maintenance of the mechanical and equipment in all county facilities.

The Building Maintenance Division provides the personnel, material and equipment to plan and direct the technical services of maintenance, custodial service, building management and county skilled trade forces for the existing county-owned facilities.

The purpose of the Macomb County Security Division is to safeguard the buildings owned and operated by Macomb County from theft, vandalism, and malicious destruction of property. An additional function of this Security Division is to assist both County, employees and/or the general public in providing information and other types of requested assistance.

#### FINANCE DIRECTOR

The Finance Director is appointed by the Board of Commissioners and has certain statutory duties prescribed by law including the maintenance of the necessary books and ledgers to control the expenditures of all County departments, and the preparation and presentation of the annual budget and the general appropriations resolution. The Finance Director supervises the County Budget and the expenditures thereunder for the Board of Commissioners to assure that a balanced budget is maintained.

The Finance Director is Secretary of the Employees Retirement Commission and performs other duties as prescribed by the Board of Commissioners.

Under authority of the Board of Commissioners, the Finance Director has the administrative responsibility for the following departments: Equalization, Accounting, Purchasing, Internal Audit and Reimbursement.

# FRIEND OF THE COURT

The Friend of the Court is an arm of the Circuit Court for the Sixteenth Judicial Circuit and is responsible for the enforcement of all Circuit Court orders and judgments entered in domestic cases involving minor children. The office is responsible for the enforcement and collection of all child support and alimony provisions and the enforcement of all visitation orders in such cases. The Friend of the Court is also responsible for investigating and recommending to the Macomb County Circuit Court on all questions regarding support, alimony, custody, visitation, change of domicile and other miscellaneous matters regarding minor children under the jurisdiction of said Court. Said office is responsible for the enforcement of all paternity, family support actions and uniform reciprocal actions and the processing and receiving of all interstate income withholding orders and foreign judgments within the jurisdiction of the Macomb County Circuit Court.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Macomb County Health Department provides a wide range of health services to maintain, improve, and protect the health of the citizens. Programs are implemented through four major divisions. Environmental Health carries out programs in the areas of food protection, community health and safety, waste, shelter and water quality management. Services include restaurant inspection, inspection of swimming pools and beaches, design and inspection of onsite sewage systems, management and risk assessment of hazardous waste, water sampling services, and general environmental management.

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Maternal and Child Health Programs are the responsibility of Community Health Nursing. Programs such as Child Health, Vision and Hearing, and Scoliosis Screening assess children to determine if problems exist and assure referrals to appropriate care. Public Health Nurses provide consultation to schools and make home visits to mothers of newborns and children with health problems. The prenatal care enrollment and paraprofessional outreach programs are efforts to assure women receive necessary prenatal care. The W.I.C. program provides supplementary food to eligible pregnant women, infants and children.

Programs of the Family Health Clinics Division include communicable disease surveillance and control, clinics to provide immunizations and influenza vaccines and treatment for tuberculosis and sexually transmitted diseases. AIDS testing and counseling is also carried out. Health assessment of seniors and public health nursing services to nutrition sites are part of the Family Health Clinics Division program.

The programs of the Health Promotion/Risk Reduction Division are directed to all age groups but with specific emphasis on the adolescent and mid-age population. Adolescent health centers are located in New Haven and in Warren. Other programs include hypertension screening, worksite wellness, family planning, car seat safety and public health nursing to middle and high schools. Health and nutrition education programs provide a wide range of information and educational services.

The Department's service facilities are located in Mt. Clemens, St. Clair Shores, and Warren.

#### HURON-CLINTON METROPOLITAN AUTHORITY

The Authority was created under permissive legislation (which required voter approval) to provide parks and recreational facilities on a regional basis for the counties of Macomb, Oakland, Wayne, Washtenaw and Livingston. It operates thirteen metroparks.

#### LAND FILE DEPARTMENT

The Land File Department manages appoximately 260,000 individual Real Estate parcels, including such information as legal descriptions, taxpayer name and address, current tax and assessment information, delinquent tax information, etc. This department further assists those units under contract to do their tax billing process by coordinating assessment and tax activity with the Macomb County Data Processing Department. Through the Land File Department, accurate delinquent tax rolls and records are produced each year.

A drafting section is in charge of updating and maintaining the accuracy of all property line drawings by plotting new subdivisions, acreage divisions and the consolidation of all lots and acreage as requested by local units, thus giving an accurate, pictorial view of all tax parcels in Macomb County.

The office of the County Treasurer's Land File Department, in conjunction with Macomb County Planning and economic department and representatives of other major county departments, are reviewing a state-of-the-art automated tax mapping system known as GIS (Geographic Information System.)

This new system will enable greater use of landfile data as a base for critically needed "technical tools" for expanding services and efficiencies by various departments, i.e., Planning, Public Works, Equalization,

Health, Clerk's, Sheriff, and Road Departments. The total benefits from a fully-activated GIS Program are limitless, depending on the data requirements of respective departments and their staff.

#### MACOMB COUNTY LIBRARY

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The Macomb County Library is a study and reference center serving all of Macomb County. Specialized services include a large reference collection, circulating nonfiction in both print (books) and non-print (videocassettes), a Career Information Center for adults in job transition, law and business collections, literary criticism, government documents, out-of-town newspapers and telephone books, and more than 800 periodicals.

As the headquarters library for the Library Cooperative of Macomb, the Macomb County Library augments and supports local libraries in the County not only with its in-depth collections but also through various centralized services such as interlibrary loan and daily delivery, ordering, cataloging and processing of library books, and maintenance of a union database of titles.

A small children's section provides services for children from townships without locally supported libraries.

The Macomb County Library administers and houses the Macomb Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped and provides other services for physically challenged residents of Macomb County. Macomb Reading Partners, which provides one-on-one volunteer tutoring for illiterate adults in the County, also operates out of the Macomb County Library.

#### MACOMB COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER

The Animal Shelter provides a holding facility for stray dogs from all of Macomb County's townships and cities. Healthy animals are available for adoption. Animal control laws are enforced and citizen questions answered.

Hours: Monday-Friday 10:00 a.m.-3:50 p.m., Saturday 10:00 a.m.-2:50 p.m. Closed Sunday & Holidays.

The Animal Shelter is administered by the Macomb County Health Department.

#### MACOMB COUNTY CRIMINAL JUSTICE MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (MACMIS)

The Macomb County Criminal Justice Management Information system is an umbrella for the County's Computerized Jail Information System that is integrated with the National Law Enforcement Information Network. This system functions under a MACMIS Policy Committee which is represented by the Circuit Court Prosecuting Attorney's Office, Sheriff Department and Macomb County M.I.S. Department. The system services each such department as well as the Probation Department. Judicial Aide, and Friend of the Court. This Committee is appointed by the Board of Commissioners, is responsible for establishing policy that protects the privacy of individuals identified in the information system maintained by MACMIS and to regulate the collection, maintenance, use and dissemination of information in accordance with Federal, state and local legislation.

The MACMIS system is an integrated, comprehensive criminal justice system for courts - prosecutors - corrections components and is designed to provide a comprehensive method for timely data capture, access and retrieval of information. The Policy Committee reviews applications for terminal requests, provides security checks for all personnel assigned to have access to the computerized information, processes complaints against personnel for security violations, provides users training, dissemination of authorized material and acts as liaison for courts, law enforcement, and corrections components of the local criminal justice system.

# MACOMB/ST. CLAIR PRIVATE INDUSTRY COUNCIL, INCORPORATED

Macomb County receives federal funds under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) to operate an employment and training program which leads to unsubsidized employment for unskilled adults and youth.

To qualified residents of Macomb or St. Clair Shores all services are free. A variety of activities include Classroom and On-the-Job Training, as well as special programs for in-school youth and a summer jobs program for young people 14 to 21 years of age. The Macomb/St. Clair Private Industry Council also administers special retraining programs targeted at dislocated workers and individuals who are 55 years of age or older and interested in job placement.

In addition to assisting unemployed residents of Macomb and St. Clair Counties to enter the workforce, the Private Industry Council provides incentives to business to hire JTPA participants by providing wage reimbursement of up to 50% during the training period. Additionally, the PIC contributes funding to economic development activities that generate employment opportunities. For more information contact (313) 469-5220.

#### MACOMB INTERMEDIATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education provides a variety of services for local school districts, including business and instructional computer support, instructional and non-instructional consulting, instructional media support, and consulting/clinical services for handicapped children and their parents.

In addition, the Board operates six schools serving the more severely mentally and emotionally impaired; provides instructional and support services for autistic impaired; early intervention services for handicapped children from birth to age three; transportation for all students attending its schools; and auxillary support services for handicapped students enrolled in local school districts. In another area, the District assists the State Department of Education in auditing roles and in teacher certification recording and reporting. The District serves as a middle agency in the three tier school system (State — Intermediate — Local) servicing both State and local schools.

#### MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEMS

This department is maintained by the Board of Commissioners to assist all county departments and agen-

cies in analyzing and implementing improvements in office procedures, and where feasible, to design and implement computer data processing systems for more efficient and economical operation.

Management Information Systems is composed of 4 sections: Computer data processing operations, systems, data entry, and communications support.

Data processing operations maintains a computer and the peripherals necessary to provide fast and efficient record keeping and report preparation.

Systems is charged with the responsibility of surveying, proposing, and implementing improvements in office procedures, and where feasible, to automate manual procedures.

The data entry section is responsible for all information required as input to the computer, and is also responsible for the data via computer terminals, and the training of terminal operators.

The communications section is responsible for the technical and operational support of county terminals, personal computers, and printers utilized by county departments.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

The ten member Commission was established in 1966 by the Board of Commissioners for the study, acquisition and development of needed parks and open space. Functioning under the Board of Commissioners, the Commission developed the William Tuckar County Park on the Clinton River Spillway and the Freedom Hill County Park at 15000 Metropolitan Parkway near Schoenherr Road. The Freedom Hill County Park, is the scene of many events including festivals, shows and musical events. Located in the park is the multi-purpose Independence Building. The William Tuckar County Park hosts picnicking and fishing.

#### PLANNING COMMISSION

The Department of Planning and Economic Development includes the Macomb County Planning Commission, created under the County Planning Act, P.A. 282, of 1945, as amended. Established in 1956, the eleven

member Planning Commission is responsible for examining the existing needs of the County, projecting future growth for the next 20 to 30 years, and suggesting a means by which this growth can be guided. The Department of Planning and Economic Development provides staff support for the Planning Commission.

Primary activities of the Department of Planning and Economic Development include research, program development and undertaking special projects for the Board of Commissioners as well as providing planning, graphic arts and audio-visual assistance to other County departments. The Planning Staff conducts a wide range of major program activities under the direct auspices of the Board of Commissioners. Major projects which are being given high priority are transit coordination, solid waste planning, public safety planning, the Board of Commissioners' Annual Report to the Macomb County citizens, and the monitoring of major thoroughfare and public transportation programs.

In addition, the Department prepares detailed maps of the County and individual municipalities, including school districts and road systems. It is the central coordinating office for U.S. Census activities and also prepares statistical reports on population, economic, land use and other planning related activities.

Community Development activities include administration of the Community Development Block Grant Program which is designed to address the needs of low and moderate income persons. Participating municipalities are eligible for community improvement and single family housing rehabilitation projects.

Economic Development activities include promotion of business and industrial expansion activity in the County through the Macomb County Community Growth Alliance, the Business Assistance Network, and the Area Development Office. Primary responsibilities include efforts to retain existing businesses and attract new businesses, assistance for initiation or expansion or businesses, and assistance in financial and site location.

#### PLAT BOARD

A plat is a plan or description for subdividing land. State law requires that a County Plat Board be created to examine and pass upon all proposed plats as to suitability, comformity to general plan, possible conflicts with other plats and conformance with street and alley layouts of adjacent plats. This board consists of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, the County Clerk and Register of Deeds and the County Treasurer.

#### PROBATE COURT

The Court has exclusive jurisdiction for: the administration of deceased persons' estates; inter-vivos and testamentary trusts; appointment of guardians and conservators for minors and legally incapacitated adults; determination and administration of disappeared persons' estates; name changes; secret marriages and waiver of certain requirements to obtain a marriage license; civil proceedings regarding the mentally ill and developmentally disabled person.

The Juvenile Division of Probate Court has original jurisdiction in cases involving juvenile delinquents, neglected and dependent children, adoptions and cases involving juvenile delinquents under 17 years of age and concurrent jurisdiction with Circuit Court for those 17 years of age.

#### RADIO DEPARTMENT

The Radio Department has the responsibility of system design, maintenance and coordination of municipal public safety radio systems for Macomb County and its political subdivisions. This includes all Federal Communications Commission licensing, writing specifications for and acting as consultant to the various police, fire, highway maintenance, departments of public works, and other agencies using two way radios. Macomb is the only county in the state offering this service for the benefit of the public.

#### REIMBURSEMENT DEPARTMENT

The department handles accounts established by the Probate Courts and other County agencies. This includes auditing time and costs, investigating the ability of responsible persons and making a recommendation to Probate Court. The main responsibility is insuring that the County is reimbursed to the maximum degree for costs incurred through Juvenile Court, Probate Court-Mental Division, Attorney Fees, Resident County Hospitalization Program, and other miscellaneous accounts. The department works closely with the Probate Courts, State of Michigan, Social Security Administration, and Friend of the Court.

#### BOARD OF ROAD COMMISSIONERS

The three Road Commissioners are appointed by the Board of County Commissioners to operate the Road Commission in accordance to the procedures as outlined in Act 51 of Public Acts of 1951, as amended.

The duties of the Road Commissioners are to formulate policies and oversee their implementation. The Road Commission receives their main revenues from the State gasoline and weight tax. The Commission constructs, operates and maintains 2,942 lane miles of County primary and local roads and 756 bridges and drainage structures. Further, the Road Commission maintains 166 miles of State Trucklines and Freeways, under contract, for the Michigan Department of Transportation.

#### SOCIAL SERVICE BOARD

The law requires that each county create a Social Services Board consisting of three members. The Board is responsible for supervising and evaluating the administration of adult hospitalization, medical care facilities (Martha T. Berry Memorial Medical Care Facility) and county foster care for children. The Board also represents the "public interest" and assures appropriate accountability for programs and services administered by the Macomb County Department of Social Services.

#### DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES

The program and administrative costs of the Department are both state and federally funded. The employees are classified as state employees under the jurisdiction of the rules and regulations established by the Michigan Civil Service Commission as well as by labor contracts. The County department, under the direction of the Michigan Department of Social Services, administers the following financial assistance programs - Aid to Dependent Children, Food Stamps, Medical Assistance, State Disability Assistance, State Emergency Relief, State Family Assistance and State Medical Program. It also administers the following social services programs - Children's Protective Services, Adult Protective Services, Adoption, Foster Care, Community based services for Delinquent Children, Foster Care Home licensing, Employment and Training programs, Adult Services and Prevention Services for Families, and Child Care Services.

#### TAX ALLOCATION BOARD

State law requires that each county have a board to allocate the constitutional 15 mill tax levy between the county, townships and school districts, on the basis of need, as determined by a survey of the tentative budgets submitted by each of the units.

# BOARD OF TAXATION (EQUALIZATION DEPARTMENT)

This department maintains assessment and equalization records, surveys, assessments and assists the Board of Commissioners in the matter of equalization of assessments and assists the local assessing officers in the performance of any duties imposed upon such officers. This includes development and maintenance of accurate property descriptions, the discovery, listing and valuation of properties for tax purposes and the development and use of uniform evaluation standards and techniques for the assessment of property.

# TRAFFIC SAFETY ASSOCIATION OF MACOMB COUNTY

State law allows each county to establish countywide traffic safety organizations. In 1965 the County established the Traffic Safety Association of Macomb County to provide assistance to all public officials in dealing with traffic safety matters, and to work with the general public in accident prevention through education. Programs included are school safety, crossing-guard training and senior citizen safety, which are presented at no cost.

Operating funds and leadership are provided by local communities, the county and private industry. In addition to direct assistance to communities, the Association develops public information for the motoring public to assist in making Macomb a safer place for everyone to drive and walk in. Also provided are National Safety Council Defensive Driving Courses for a nominal fee.

The Alcohol Highway Safety Program is administered by the Association. The program is an educational approach to the problem of drinking and driving. Judges and Secretary of State personnel refer participants to the program.

#### **VETERANS AFFAIRS**

This department provides assistance to Veterans' and/or their dependents filling out the necessary forms to file claims for Federal benefits with the United States Department of Veteran Affairs on a large cross section of human resources. Some of the claims that are filed are Disability Compensation, Veterans' and Widows' Pension, Home Loans, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation, Vocational Rehabilitation Traiming, Federal, State and County Burials, Military Affairs, Government Life Insurance, Educational Claims, VA Medical Treatment, Appeals on Veterans' Claims, Career Development Counseling, Discharge Upgrades and Review of Military Records.

Also included, is the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund, County Soldiers and Sailors Relief program, WWI Veterans Hospital program, as well as, Guidance and Counseling on many problems affecting the Veterans' and/or their dependents.


